Location: SMA High School campus. The chairman called the meeting to order at 2:32 pm.

LTC Ben Weiss introduced Cadet Jordan Williams to the board to present an overview of the most recent West Point trip she and other cadets attended. SMA-COL Christina Bowman praised LTC Weiss for the idea of visiting West Point and seeing it through and looks forward to continuing this trip.

LTG Howard Crowell presented to SMA-COL Bowman a five-thousand dollar check on behalf of his Rotary Club to go towards the Feed the Troops program.

Motion to Approve the Minutes from the 8 November, 2018 meeting:

COL Ben Knisely motioned for approval of the 8 November, 2018 minutes; Mr. F. Steven Herb seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

Executive Director of School Report: SMA-COL Bowman mentioned giving the staff and faculty of both schools the professional day of 21st of December a paid day off as a show of appreciation. Chairman Jones inquired about enrollment in which SMA-COL Bowman responded that the Shadowing Program from the Prep is very successful.

SMA-COL Bowman stated the School Recognition Funds have been voted on for disbursement as follows:

- Florida School Recognition Funds
 - The Florida School Recognition Program provides financial awards to schools that demonstrate sustained or significantly improved student performance. SMA has been recognized as a school with significant improved student performance and must determine how the financial award is allocated. Six choices were presented to the faculty and staff and voted on only by employees who were employed during the 2017-2018 school year. The vote was finalized on November 27, 2018.
 - Choices and outcome:
 - 1) Financial award is allocated to all faculty and staff members who were employed at SMA for the 2017-2018 school year and have continued employment for the 2018-2019 school year. The apportionment will be calculated according to employment status such as part-time and full-time status from the 2017-2018 school year: 82.43%
 - 2) Allocate funds for school projects that directly benefit the cadets: 1.35%
 - 3) Allocate funds to temporary personnel to assist in maintaining or improving student performance: 0.00%
 - 4) Combine/distribute funds for #1 and #2: 9.46%
 - 5) Combine/distribute funds for #1 and #3: 5.41%
 - 6) Combine/distribute funds for #2 and #3: 1.35%

SMA-COL Bowman identified choice number one having received the majority of the vote by faculty and staff at 82.43% and asked the board to approve and support the allocation of the School Recognition Funds (A+ money), as voted on.

Ms. Carter Donovan motioned for approval of the allocation of the School Recognition Funds; COL Ben Knisely seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

SMA Prep Head of School Report: SMA-LTC Tom Vara provided a read-ahead report. SMA-LTC Lisa Currie announced Dr. Todd Brown received the Ignite Innovation Award from Sarasota County which was the first time a charter school teacher had won. Chairman Jones suggested honoring Dr. Brown at the next board meeting.

SMA Prep Athletics Report: SMA-CPT Leslie Smith provided a read-ahead report. She mentioned twenty-five cadets came out for wrestling in which twenty stayed and that the boys won the championship in cross country.

MYP: SMA-LTC Currie provided a read-ahead report. She mentioned two more grants were received from FLIBS (Florida League of IB Schools) and two cadets were recognized by the community for their Clean the Beaches project.

SMA Head of School Report: SMA-LTC Fred Fout provided a read-ahead report. He mentioned the winter concert on the 18th December and the successful assembly held today, spearheaded by Dr. Clapp, on Mental Health. SMA-LTC Fout discussed the charter school principal meetings and mentioned meeting regularly for combined support.

SMA HS Athletics Report: Athletic Director Coach Amy Mazner provided a readahead report.

IB Report: SMA-LTC Pamela Donehew submitted a read-ahead report. She invited the board to the informational meeting that evening to discuss IB, AP and DE as well as the IB Banquet on May 11th, 2019. SMA-LTC Donehew mentioned four parents who donated 1K each so that seniors can attend the banquet for free and she also mentioned how the IB community within SMA is growing. Chairman Jones thanked her for attending the Strategic Planning Committee meetings as her input was valuable.

SAI/Commandant's Report: LTC Weiss provided a read-ahead report. He mentioned the Raiders mixed team came first at nationals with the females placing fourth. LTC Weiss mentioned the Veterans of Foreign Wars sponsors a Voice of Democracy Contest in which our cadet has made it to states with the hopes of nationals next. He invited the board to the Winter Formal for seniors only held at Lakewood Ranch's Even Hotel on 21st January.

Staff Representatives: SMA-CPT Terri Davis thanked the board for the 21st of December as a paid day off and that the staff is very appreciative. MSG Johnny Browning mentioned the staff believes the good changes that are happening at the

high school stem from newcomers SMA-LTC Fout, Dr. Cathy Rodriguez and LTC Weiss.

Treasurer's Report: Mr. Kimball Bobbitt provided a read-ahead report. Mr. Herb motioned to approve the treasurer's report; Dr. Tom McElheny seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

Dr. McElheny proposed replacing the word "supporting" to "promoting" in which board agreed and SMA-COL Bowman will make the revision.

Mr. Herb motioned for approval of the 15 November, 2018 Budget Committee Meeting minutes and the 19 November, 2018 and 6 December, 2018 Strategic Planning Committee minutes; Mr. Frederick Derr seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

IB MYP Read Ahead - 1/17/18 SMA-MAJ Lisa Currie

Reflecting on progress, achievements, and challenges still ahead is a useful practice as we enter 2019 and continue to develop a vision and shape the culture of SMA. What is most important to grasp about SMA Prep is that we are a whole school IB Middle Years Program that has its foundation built in military structure and values. This statement is repeated often because this combination is precisely why we continue to have a loyal following, positive word of mouth, and strong enrollment. SMA Prep has become the trailblazers in middle school education and this goes beyond merely calling ourselves an "IB World School". SMA Prep actually delivers on the IB Mission: "The International Baccalaureate aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect." It is the passion of many of our teachers and their fearless vision that push all of us to reach higher, try new approaches, and remind ourselves that learning goes beyond the memorization of facts and the classroom walls themselves.

Being an IB World School also allows our teachers to become exceptional at what they do. Two teachers have received further recognition recently that directly tie into IB:

Deb Walker Wins Florida Excellence in Teaching about Agriculture Award

"The Gainesville-based, non-profit organization, Florida Agriculture in the Classroom, selected SMA-MAJ Deb Walker, middle school IB Design AgriScience teacher, as 1 of 3 winners from a field of candidates because they best exemplified teachers who use agriculture in their yearlong instruction. "These teachers are going above and beyond the classroom with their use of experiential learning and FAITC is honored to be able to recognize them for their hard work." said Carol Roe, Chairman of the FAITC Board of Directors. SMA-MAJ Walker teaches her 6th graders the importance of their generation to feed the growing population in our future. Her students are taught how to research, plan, experiment and evaluate different agriculture methods to achieve success. Deb also teaches her students about astrobotany and her school was accepted into the NASA Growing Beyond Earth Projects where NASA sends vegetable seeds to middle schools to germinate and grow plants under various conditions. Plants that do well are tested at Kennedy Space Center and then sent to the International Space Station."

Dr. Todd Brown has become 1 of 50 people in 193 countries that were chosen to be UN Sustainable Development Goals Ambassador for 2019. He will report to both the program director and the Office of the President of the United Nations General Assembly throughout the year. Outside of the Director, he is the only person in the state of Florida in this cohort. The UN Sustainable Development Goals are also part of the IB World School framework.

These exceptional teachers, among others, truly embody the value of students making connections to the larger world around them. What our kids need to be successful in the world continues to shift and the IB MYP framework offers the leverage and the best practice resources to confidently move forward and challenge our teachers and students to be innovative in ways other middle schools in the area cannot. The more knowledgeable all of us are about the new developments happening in education today, the more obvious it becomes that SMA is leading the way as a forward thinking and impactful IB World School model.

- 1) The FHSAA will be reclassifying all districts for the 2019-2020 through to June 2021.
- 2) Each member school has now submitted student enrollment data for the current school year. This student enrollment data will be used to determine the classification of each school in their participating sports for the upcoming classification cycle.
- 3) FHSAA January 2019
 - Sport Commitments Due (all remaining sports via Home Campus-FHSAA network for schools).
 - Fall Sport Classifications and Districts Released (Cross Country, Golf, Volleyball)

March 2019

Winter Sport Classifications and Districts Released (Basketball, Soccer, Wrestling)

May/June 2019

- Spring Sport Classifications and Districts Released (Lacrosse)
- 4) What does this mean?
 - a. FHSAA reclassifies every 3 years according to enrollment.
 - b. The FHSAA is no longer requiring schools to play their districted teams this will allow for more freedom of scheduling as well as saving HUGE amounts of money in transportation costs.
 - c. Each school will still have a district and will still be eligible for the State Playoff series according to their MaxPreps ratings. MaxPreps is the Official Scores and Statistics Provider of the FHSAA.
 - d. If an SMA team qualifies for the "playoffs" we will be notified and then compete against a Districted team to see who wins to advance... A team might still advance even if they do not win their respected District, they will again use the MaxPreps rankings for the State Playoff Series.
- 5) Forming a local Conference **Manasota Activities Conference** which is allowed by the FHSAA and will create more of a local sporting culture among schools our size and level of competition.
 - a. Middle Schools are included and encouraged to join. All the AD's meet monthly.
 - b. SMA, ODA, Mooney, St. Stephens, Bradenton Christian, Sarasota Christian and Imagine North Port = 7
 - c. All sports SMA currently offers will participate. If a school does not offers a sport it is ok.
 - d. Each HS sport and school within the conference will play at least 1 contest vs one another. If they wish to schedule another it is acceptable. Middle School sports will play twice.
 - e. All AD's involved are working diligently to solidify by-laws and agreeable structure for the conference. As time passes we will institute conference playoffs, awards, etc...
 - f. Manasota Activities Conference teams "could" be in FHSAA Districts...notified in March.
 - g. Middle School scheduling is first on the level of importance. We are working on becoming a "combined" school with the FHSAA.

Stay local and play local will create an excellent sporting environment as well as saving schools thousands of dollars in transportation costs for the High Schools. It may create challenges for our middle school but nothing we cannot work through. Scheduling, Transportation & Official Associations will need to be discussed further.
