The chair called the meeting to order at 2:33 pm.

Motion to Approve the 21 September 2021 Minutes:

Ms. Cynthia West motioned to approve the 21 September, 2021 minutes; COL Ben Knisely seconded the motion and the board unanimously approved.

Executive Director of Schools Report: SMA-COL Christina Bowman mentioned that new hires to fill are currently the bus driver and science positions. She stated speaking with Mr. Daniel Kennedy, the Veterans Day parade marshal, on finalizing details for all our cadets grades six through twelve marching in the parade. SMA-COL Bowman discussed the current enrollment numbers by campus as well as the breakdown of accepted applications. She stated a date to be scheduled for the training session on the school grade.

SMA Head of School Report, Middle School: SMA-COL Tom Vara provided a read-ahead report. He discussed the school improvement plan with the county concentrating on student growth and where gains can be attained.

<u>SMA Middle School Athletics Report</u>: SMA-MAJ Leslie Smith provided a read-ahead report. SMA-COL Vara stated that volleyball, basketball and cross-country are in season.

SMA Head of School Report, High School: SMA-COL Fred Fout provided a read-ahead report. He stated an excellent turnout to the ASVAB test on campus and will have a session with the cadets to review their results. SMA-COL Fout discussed the PSAT for all tenth graders was administered that morning along with the site based SAT test for those seniors who needed to pass for graduation. He mentioned our SPIN event on the 3rd of November highlighting all academic clubs and classes and targeting new families and eighth grade middle school as well as the Veterans Day Parade on the 11th of November.

<u>SMA High School Athletics Report</u>: SMA-COL Fout stated a successful volleyball season ending in a great turnout for senior night honoring four seniors.

SAI/Commandant's Report: LTC Weiss provided a read-ahead report. He stated four new color guards and the upcoming West Point trip with assistance in a grant from the SMA Foundation. LTC Weiss mentioned a scheduled trip to the Naval Academy and in the process of securing an Air Force Academy trip. He stated attending the Marine Birthday Dinner on the 10th of November along with cadets thanks to the board chair, Dr. Thomas McElheny. COL Knisely mentioned the two female alumni currently seniors at U.S. Military Academy at West Point are both leading the rifle team to the best season West Point has ever seen. LTC Weiss stated that the speaker at this year's Military Ball is the Director of Admissions at West Point.

<u>Staff Representatives</u>: SMA-MAJ Smith stated no staff concerns at this time at the middle school. SMA-COL Fout stated that he spoke with SFC Riess Pellegrino and will handle administratively.

Treasurer's Report: SMA-LTC Steve Kok and treasurer Mr. Scott Lempe provided a read-ahead report and balance sheets per campus. He discussed a condensed profit and loss statement to highlight the Florida Retirement System and the ESSER funds. 





SMA Prep Instructional Design & Curriculum Read Ahead - 11/4/2021 SMA-MAJ Lisa Currie

An instructional priority for 2021-22 at SMA Prep is to empower learners to take ownership of their learning to promote motivation, engagement, and self-direction in their own learning process. This is also a shorthand definition of a learner-centered approach. One aspect is for students to develop the skills necessary to set learning goals using progress monitoring results to work toward mastery. Students work with their teachers to implement personalized strategies to achieve their goals working toward mastery and improving learning gains.

A specific aspect of a learner-centered approach is developing a student's assessment literacy. Assessment literacy is the ability to use various forms of assessment to inform personalized goal setting for students and next steps in instruction for educators. Internal progress monitoring assessments occur quarterly at Prep.

For students, how is this being implemented and what are the expected outcomes?

- 1. Students access, record, and analyze their own data from 2020 FSA results and current progress monitoring data through IXL, Power-up, and USATest Prep.
- 2. Students have successfully created personalized datasheets with performance data, collected overtime, for Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies.
- 3. Students analyze their data and develop an understanding of learning as a process overtime in order to set and continually adjust learning goals to reach mastery.
- 4. Students take ownership of their learning process allowing for improvement in learning gains.

For teachers, how is this being implemented and what are the expected outcomes?

- 1. Math, Reading, and Science data sheets are submitted to all teachers through their Google Classrooms.
- 2. Datasheet format provides teachers *user-friendly* student progress information in the 4 core classes that inform not only core teachers, but all teachers about opportunities for differentiation and cross-curricular opportunities to support learning goals.

This will be an iterative process as students and teachers interact more often with the information and begin to implement goal setting. This is a process that can continue through grade levels for even more efficiency and effectiveness in the improvement of learning gains in all learners.






